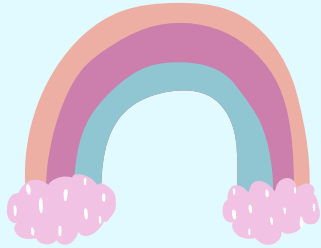

Guiding Principles for Gender-Affirming Care During COVID-19 Information for Trans, NonBinary, and Gender-Diverse Patients



HANG IN THERE. We understand the importance of your gender-affirming care. There are many long-awaited gender-affirming appointments or procedures, which are now being canceled or postponed. We also understand that hospitals are struggling to serve a large number of people with COVID-19 cases that are immediately life-threatening and that moving forward with in-person gender-affirming services increases your risk of possible exposure to the COVID-19 virus. Please know that we are doing what we can to ensure providers and insurers understand the importance of gender-affirming care and that these procedures are seen as priorities when it comes time to reschedule. BE AWARE. Stay indoors as much as possible. Keep a safe distance. Wash your hands thoroughly and often. Cover your mouth and nose with a face covering in the presence of others or if you are sick. Cover coughs and sneezes. Clean and disinfect surfaces daily. If you feel ill, call your doctor.
